Course Description

Involving the patient in treatment through excellent communication skills results in higher levels of adherence, better clinical outcomes as well as increased patient satisfaction. This course describes how to actively involve the patient in treatment planning through the Ozer, Payton, Nelson Method (OPN). The OPN Method is a structured, cyclical process of helping patients identify concerns, establish goals, identify outcomes and evaluate the patient treatment plan. This course will develop your professional communication skills, and show you how to use the OPN Method to achieve greater success in your practice.

Who Should Attend?

Appropriate for health care professionals who value patient communication and want to enhance their practice through proven patient-centered communication methods.

Course Location

The OPN Method Course will be held on the SUNY Upstate Medical University campus in Room 2231 Weiskotten Hall, 766 Irving Ave., Syracuse New York On-site parking will be available.

Cost

The course is \$150 and \$75 for students. SUNY Upstate Physical Therapy Course Instructors receive a \$25 discount. The tuition includes course materials, breaks, and parking. Lunch is on your own with many nearby restaurants to choose from.


Course Background:

Patients and their families are becoming more active consumers of health care services and are expecting to participate in decision-making. Studies show that involving patients in the treatment planning process improves adherence, clinical outcomes and discharge planning, and decreases patient anxiety and malpractice suits.

The vast majority of therapists believe they involve patients yet the literature demonstrates just the opposite; most therapists involve patients at far less than optimal levels. Among the reasons cited are:

- Therapists confuse conversation skills, which most have, with professional communication skills, which most do not possess [Psychosocial Aspects of Clinical Practice]
- Clinicians are not adequately prepared [Institute of Medicine]
- Informal interview is the most often used method to involve the patient, even though this method has been demonstrated to be inadequate and inconsistently applied. [American Journal of Occupational Therapy].

The Ozer, Payton, Nelson (OPN) Method was designed as a systematic and efficient method to actively involve patients in treatment planning.





Introduction and overview of the Ozer.

Course Objectives

With your ACTIVE participation, you will be able to use the OPN Method to:

- 1. Assist a patient to identify a specific concern
- 2. Assist a patient to transform the major concern into a specific goal
- 3. Assist a patient to generate outcome statements relative to identified goals
- 4. Identify common barriers and potential solutions to involving patients in treatment planning.
- 5. Reflect the OPN Method into your clinical documentation
- 6. Construct a self-directed learning plan to guide you in implementing the OPN method in your practice.

Presentation

Lecture, discussion, group experiential learning, analysis of videotaped patient interviews, and peer reviews are used to achieve the course purpose and objectives. Participants will experience the process in small groups. Participants will then use the OPN Method to interview at least one other participant. After these peer interviews, participants will again experience the OPN Method by identifying the outcomes of the interviews.
